The doorcase has plain pilasters with moulded caps and necking moulding, plain frieze and flat cornice hood; the frieze and bed mould of the cornice break forward over the pilasters. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24 (consec) ,Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec), Cambridge Lodge, Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.	
PARK STREET (South side) No 4 with entrance to Black Lion Yard	*	The entrance to the Yard is a large rectangular opening the height of the ground floor, and the 1st, 2nd and attic floors over form part of No 4 but are of different design and are described separately. Late C18 red brick, parapet with stone doping old tile Mansard roof. No 4 Late C18, 3 storeys, attic and cellar, red brick on projecting stuccoed plinth, parapet with stone coping, old tile Mansard roof. The House has 2 dormer windows with small moulded cornice, 3 windows on the upper floors and 2 windows on the ground floor, 6-panelled door with rectangular fanlight, semi-circular and radiating glazing pattern, recessed in panelled reveal. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard Nos 20 to 24 (consec). Cambridge Lodge, Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.	
PARK STREET (South Side) No 5 (Ann Foorde's House)	*	A tall C18 house 3 storeys, attic and cellars red brick, parapet with stone coping, old tile mansard roof. There are 2 casement dormer windows in the attic, 3 windows on the upper floors and one late C19 rectangular moulded brick bay to right hand on ground floor with a 12-light mullioned and transomed window and moulded brick corbelled apron. The 6-panelled door with semi-circular radiating and wreathed fanlight over, in arched panelled reveals is to the left hand approached by 4 stone steps, The doorcase has engaged fluted Doric columns with cap mouldings carried round reveals and head of the door. The arch has a small architrave and key block. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24 (consec), Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec). PARK STREET (South Side) No 6	*	Late Cl8, 3 storeys, attic and cellar, red brick on projecting rendered plinth, parapet with stone coping, old tile mansard roof. The house has 2 dormers with small moulded cornices, 3 windows on upper floors, 2 windows on ground floor and 6-panelled door to right hand. The door has a rectangular fanlight over with segmental and radiating pattern in wood and is recessed in panelled reveals. The doorcase is similar to that of No 4. 2 windows in cellar. Note:- Nos 4, 5 and 6 Park Street form a symmetrical group, and, apart from the bay window in No 5 in their original condition externally. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24 (consec), Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec) Cambridge Lodge, Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.	
PARK STREET (South Side) No 7	11	C18. 2 storeys and attic, red and vitreous chequer brickwork, parapet with stone coping, old tile roof hipped to left hand. The house has 1 dormer window in attic, 3 windows on the 1st floor, and a late C19 rectangular bay to right hand on ground floor with 6 large paned mullioned and transomed lights. There is a 4-panelled door to right hand with brass vase and wreath knocker, and a rectangular fanlight over, semi-circular and radiating pattern. The door is surrounded by an architrave and has a flat moulded hood on cut brackets. There are 3 stone steps and a stone landing with contemporary wrought- iron railings with urn corner standards and scrolls swept up to the house. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24 (consec), Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec) Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.	
PARK STREET (South Side) No 8	II	C18 with later C18 heightening, 3 storeys, ground floor stuccoed 1st floor plum bricks, 2nd floor and parapet London stocks, projecting plinth, strings over ground floor windows and 1st floor cill level, old tile roof. There are 3 windows on the upper floors, the 2nd floor windows are square, 2 tall casement windows with no glazing bars on ground floor each with a moulded stucco panel under, and a 4-panelled door to the right hand the 2 bottom panels horizontal. There is a flat moulded hood on cut wood brackets. Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24(consec). Archway Nos 29 to 35 (consec) Cambridge Lodge, Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.

PARK STREET (South Side) Nos 9 to 11 (consec)	*	3 early C19 houses forming a symmetrical group, 3 storeys and basement, London stock brick, small modillioned Portland stone cornice and blocking course over 2nd floor windows, slate roof. No 9 has 4 windows on upper floors, 3 windows on ground floor and tall 6-panelled flush door to left hand of centre. The door has a rectangular moulded wooden panel at its head and a semi-circular, radiating and concentric fanlight, all under an lonic portico consisting of 2 columns, 2 pilasters, entablature and pediment at the top of 5 moulded stone steps. There are 3 windows in the basement and the areas have light geometrical cast-iron railings. Nos 10 and 11 are of similar materials and design but 3 bays wide. No 10 is flanked by 2 cast lead rainwater head and pipes with small lion masks on heads. Each house has 3 windows on the upper floors, 2 window on the ground floor and a 6-panelled door to left hand in brick arched recess. PARK STREET (South Side) Nos 12 to 16 (consec)	*	An early C19 terrace of 5 houses, 3 storeys and basement, stucco rusticated ground floor treatment, string at 1st floor level, Nos 12 and 19 are recessed with composite piers at the outer angles and 2 engaged composite columns between the windows. An entablature runs the whole length of the terrace with balustrading pierced over windows. Slate mansard roof. Each house has 2 dormer windows. Slate mansard roof. Each house has 2 dormer windows, 3 square windows on the 2nd floor. A continuous balcony similar to that of Nos 12 and 15 is carried across the 2 houses, site ground floor windows are rectangular, those of No 13 have no glazing bars. The arched doors are grouped in centre. All the doors have a large single panel and the fanlights have concentric glazing. The corner is recessed with 2 Doric columns and plain window. Park Street Lodge, Nos 20 to 24 (consec), Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec). Cambridge Lodge, Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.

The doorcase consists of Doric pilasters, broken architrave, plain frieze and denticulated and moulded flat cornice. The pilasters stand on tall plinths on 3 stone steps. There are 2 blocked windows in the basement. No 21 and No 22 have link value only. Modern in C18 character 2 storeys and attic, brick, bracketted cornice, tile roof. PARK STREET (North Side) Nos 21 and 22	11	Circa 1910-20 pair. Good early Georgian style infill. 2 storeys and attic red brick with stone plinth. Band between storeys. Bracketed wood eaves cornice, gable end tiled roof with 3 hipped dormers. Flush framed glazing bar sashes, narrow to centre above paired doorways. 6 panel doors, rectangular fanlights, stone pilasters and long fluted brackets, with dosserets, to flat hood. Included for group interest. ' Park Street Lodge, Nos 2 to 16 (consec), entrance to Black Lion Yard, Nos 20 to 24 (consec). Archway to Royal Mews, Nos 29 to 35 (consec). Cambridge Gate and Park Street Gate form a group.	
PARK STREET (North Side) Nos 23 and 24	11	A pair of houses, C18, 3 storeys and cellar. Red brick with vertical lines of vitreous brick between windows, painted plinth and door surrounds, moulded brick string with tile creasing over 2nd floor windows, brick parapet with stone coping and old tile roof. There are 8 semi-circular headed casement windows on the 2nd floor, 4 windows without glazing bars on the 1st floor, 6 windows on the ground floor and 2 6-panelled doors No 23 with 3-pane rectangular fanlight, No 24 with plain rectangular fanlight. The doors are in rusticated brick jambs with moulded caps, plain frieze, denticulated cornice (part of that of No 24 missing) and blocking cornice. Each door has 3 stone steps, 2 central windows (1 blocked) in cellar. PEASCOD STREET (South East Side) No 32	II	Early C19. 3 storeys rusticated stucco. 3 sashes in architrave surrounds. Ground floor has 3 wide openings, the centre a door with side lights and fanlight and pilasters at the sides. The left hand opening is similar but has vermiculated rustications, probably mid C19; the right hand is similar but has a 3 light sash window. Capped parapet with shaped raised centre. Full height one window extension to right with carriage arch in matching style.	
PEASCOD STREET (South East Side) No 33	II	Circa 1800 road block formerly part of a pair. 2 storeys stucco faced with cornice and parapet. Mansard slate roof with 2 dormers. 2 C19 sashes 1st floor modern shop front. To rear of this circa 1800 house in the yard of the Bakers Arms is the remaining part of a C17 timber framed building of box frame type. 2 storeys with one small windows 1st floor level - painted brick nogging. Late C18 former pair of 3 storey houses, stucco faced above modern shop fronts and with red brick long wing to Goswell Hill. Later alterations. The front elevation has quoin pilasters and dividing pilaster, plain parapet, cornice removed. 2nd floor sill band between pilasters. 2 windows each to upper floors all with glazing bar sashes. Lead rainwater head decorated with putto in relief. Return to Goswell Hill has wooden cornice to old tile roof and wood beam tied in above 1st floor Near flush framed sash windows, slightly cambered header arches. Hatchway (loading bay) and large 3 light works window set in what may have been former coach house entrance. Entrance to No 134A pilastered with archivolt arch and key. The north end of this elevation is stucco faced with shaped gable - camber arched glazing bar sash to attic, 2 partly glazed hatches 1st floor and one window and double door on ground floor.	
PEASCOD STREET (North West Side) Nos 135 and 136		Nos 135 and 136 comprise a High Victorian elevation above modern shop fronts on the ground floor. The front is dated 1866 and is of red brick with stone dressing and some patterned brickwork, treated in a symmetrical, restrained Venetian style. Sill courses to the upper floors and moulded impost strings; moulded bed to frieze with plain, capped tri glyphs and projecting moulded eaves cornice. 4 windows to 1st and 2nd floors, round headed brick voussoir arches with pointed stone arches above containing delicate floral and scroll carving. The central pair of windows have linked arches and are flanked by roundels and small carved panels. Coupled and tripled squat, round headed 2nd floor windows with patterned brick voussoir arches rising from carved leaf imposts; projecting sills, that to centre group more prominent with cast iron flower guard.

There is 1 window in the central bay and 2 hipped dormers in the attic; 3 windows with flush architrave frames and segmental heads on the 1st floor and 2 similar windows on the ground floor. Central 7 panelled recessed door in plain cut brackets and flat moulded hood with bed-mould carried round the brackets. Small contemporary wrought iron scroll scrapers.
